Fall Apologetics Series - Answering Bart Ehrman Week 5 - "Ehrman's Root Problem"

Week 1: <u>Jesus</u> being a <u>historical</u> person, is <u>central</u> to the message of <u>salvation</u>.

Week 2: The <u>copies</u> of the <u>NT</u> manuscripts are <u>closer</u> to their original writings than the <u>majority</u> of ancient documents, and there are <u>more</u> of them.

Week 3: God's <u>word</u> is <u>inerrant</u> in that it is <u>trustworthy</u> and <u>authoritative</u>, and <u>infallible</u> in <u>purpose</u> of communicating the way to <u>salvation</u>.

Week 4: God wants us to be <u>assured</u> that we have his <u>intended inspired</u> word.

Week 5 - The Problem of Suffering

Ehrman's Problem: If <u>God</u> were <u>good</u> and <u>all</u>-<u>powerful</u>, then there would be <u>no suffering</u> in the world.

The **Theoretical** Problem:

- 1) If there is a **wholly good** and **all-powerful** being, then there should be **no evil** or **suffering**.
 - 2) There **is** evil and suffering
- 3) Therefore there is **no** wholly good and all-powerful being.

Four Stances in Response:

- 1) **Evil** is a **counterpoint** to **good**.
- 2) Evil is **necessary** to bring about good.
- 3) The universe is **better** with a **little** evil in it.
- 4) Evil comes from a creature's free will.

The **Practical** Problem:

Scripture's <u>answer</u> to the <u>practical</u> problem of <u>evil</u> is to <u>sit</u> and have <u>compassion</u> on those who <u>suffer</u>.

In a world where <u>sin</u> has <u>brought</u> suffering, God works <u>through</u> it to bring about his <u>goodness</u>, because <u>he suffers</u> with those who suffer.
